**Mercer Pan-Hellenic Council

Colleges To Be Present**

The Association of Georgia Colleges will meet in its twenty-third session in Macon, January 27 and 28 with headquarters at the Hotel Dempsey. Representatives from fourteen colleges and nine junior colleges will be present for the two-day program. Dr. Paul M. Cousins of Shorter College is the president of the Association, and Mr. William D. Hooper, of the University of Georgia, is the secretary-treasurer.

An informal dinner at 7 o'clock Friday evening at the Dempsey will open the meeting of the Association at which time Dean Walter J. Matherly of the University of Florida will give an address on "The Finished Products of the American College." The music for the program will be furnished by Mercer University.

Meeting Continued

The meeting is to be continued at 9:15 Saturday morning at which time various reports from committees and other business matters will be discussed. Representatives from the Georgia Colleges will speak on topics of interest to college life. Dean John B. Clark of Mercer will use as his subject "Adequate Library Facilities." Other speakers included on the program are Dean Walter Cocking of the University of Georgia, Dean Goodrich White of Emory University, President J. E. McCain of James Scott College, Mr. J. C. Wardlaw of the University System of Georgia, and President Eric W. Hardy of Junior College of Augusta.

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Four New Settings Under Construction By Mercer Players

Four new settings for THE IRON COLLAR, now in rehearsal for production early in March, are being constructed by the Mercer Players with Jack Powell as scenic artist and Hillis Hollingsworth as stage manager.

Because the play represents the life of Percy Bysshe Shelley, a poetic character, the new scenery will offer a more advanced form of stylized mounting than the local Thespians have ever used before. Each act of the play will be given a setting that makes a pleasing stage-picture, appropriate to the dramatic action, with no attempt at realistic verisimilitude.

The new scenery from the standpoint of engineering belongs to the "vest-pocket" type. Everything Everything folds into small, compact units that are light in weight for convenience in transportation. Thus if Mercer University should decide to build a new stage floor in the semi-circular room behind the chapel building, the Mercer Players could set up their stage in the gymnasium, and have the gym clear again within perhaps an hour.

Committeemen Start Drive For More Good-Will

**"Why Endow Mercer?" Pam-
phlets Will Be First Step
Of Alumni**

The alumni, executive, and endowment committees met last Friday with the object of putting on a drive, not to immediately get funds, but to organize the alumni into a body to influence wealthy persons into considering Mercer in their wills and giving bequests to Mercer.

The first step in this program will be the putting out of pamphlets entitled, "Why Endow Mercer?" This booklet is in three parts, the first one by Justice R. C. Bell of the supreme court of Georgia, president of the alumni association. He gives reasons for endowing Mercer in view of her past performance during the last hundred years.

Dowell Writes

The second division will be written by President Dowell, describing his concept of Mercer's need as she goes into the second century of service to her state and to society.

Judge John B. Guerry of the state court of appeals, chairman of the alumni endowment committee, in the third part shows how Mercer can be endowed by the alumni organizing themselves into a body constantly on the alert to get wealthy people to include Mercer in their wills.

"This is a long-time program," said Professor Josiah Crudup, alumni secretary. "Immediate returns are not expected, but the income will increase as the progress gains momentum."

This pamphlet will be sent to alumni, Baptist ministers and all wealthy people recommended by the alumni. There will also be launched a campaign to prepare and make possible for other

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
