

BSU TO ELECT NEW OFFICERS

The various units of the Mercer Baptist Student Union will meet together at Roberts Chapel, Tuesday, April 2, at 7:30 p. m., to elect officers for the next school year, Norman Shands, BSU president, announced.

In addition, Mrs. Robin Wood, of the state department of agriculture, will be present to organize within the B.S.U., a Mercer rural-urban club. The purpose of such a club is to bring about a greater degree of cooperation between city and county people in working out county problems. The undertaking on Mercer's campus will seek to lead student participation in informing themselves on the conditions within their home counties, beginning with the status of the country churches. Action to be taken will then be determined.

In connection with plans for the mass meeting, President Shands stated that all Baptist students and all others who are members of any religious organization in the city may consider themselves as members of the general Baptist Student Union, and hence have the privilege of voting for its officers.

Muscle of the Moment

For the benefit of those who have recently become interested in Erskine Hawkins, due to the amazing success of his Tuxedo Junction, we devote this week's discourse to the twentieth century Gabriel.

Hawkins hails from Alabama, where he was a student at Alabama State College. He's about 26 years old and formed his first band while still in school — that group recorded for Vocalion under the name of Erskine Hawkins' Bama State Collegians. The best of their waxings was Carry Me Back To Old Virginia, which is still well worth listening to.

Since leaving Alabama, Old Gab has found success at the Savoy ballroom in New York and has toured all the eastern half of the country.

Erskine writes most of the tunes his band plays. He has several other composers of merit in the band to-wit: William Johnson and Julian Dash—sax men — Avery Parish, his pianist, and Samuel Lowe who sits in the trumpet section. The first two collaborated on the "Junction."

The band has a tremendous brass section backed up by excellent reeds. They shine on a slow sort of swing but do well on sweeties also.
