Dr. T. L. Holcomb Scheduled To Preach Baccalaureate Sermon

For the first time in the history of this 107-year-old institution a woman will deliver the commencement address to a graduating class.

The speaker is Mrs. Walter D. Lamar, a Macon resident, immediate past president of the United Daughters of the Confederacy and Georgia director of the Robert E. Lee Foundation for Stratford-on-the-Potomac.

Mrs. Lamar will address 57 arts school seniors and nine law school students who will receive degrees at exercises Monday night, June 3, in the University auditorium.

Commencement services will begin Sunday morning, June 2, when Dr. T. L. Holcomb, executive secretary of the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist convention, delivers the baccalaureate sermon at the First Baptist church. The church services will start at 11:30.

T. Baldwin Martin, president of the Mercer Alumni association, will give the annual president's address at an alumni meeting at 11 o'clock Monday morning in the chapel, and the annual alumni address will be delivered by Judge Warren Grice, class of '94, of the State Supreme Court.

Following these meetings the alumni luncheon will be served in Sherwood hall dining room at 1:30. At this time there will be a reunion of classes ending in the numerals five and zero.

A reception in honor of the graduating seniors will be held in President Spright Dowell's home at 5 p. m.
