The highest rating of any campus group was achieved by the pledges of Phi Eta Sigma, who averaged 2,500 points.



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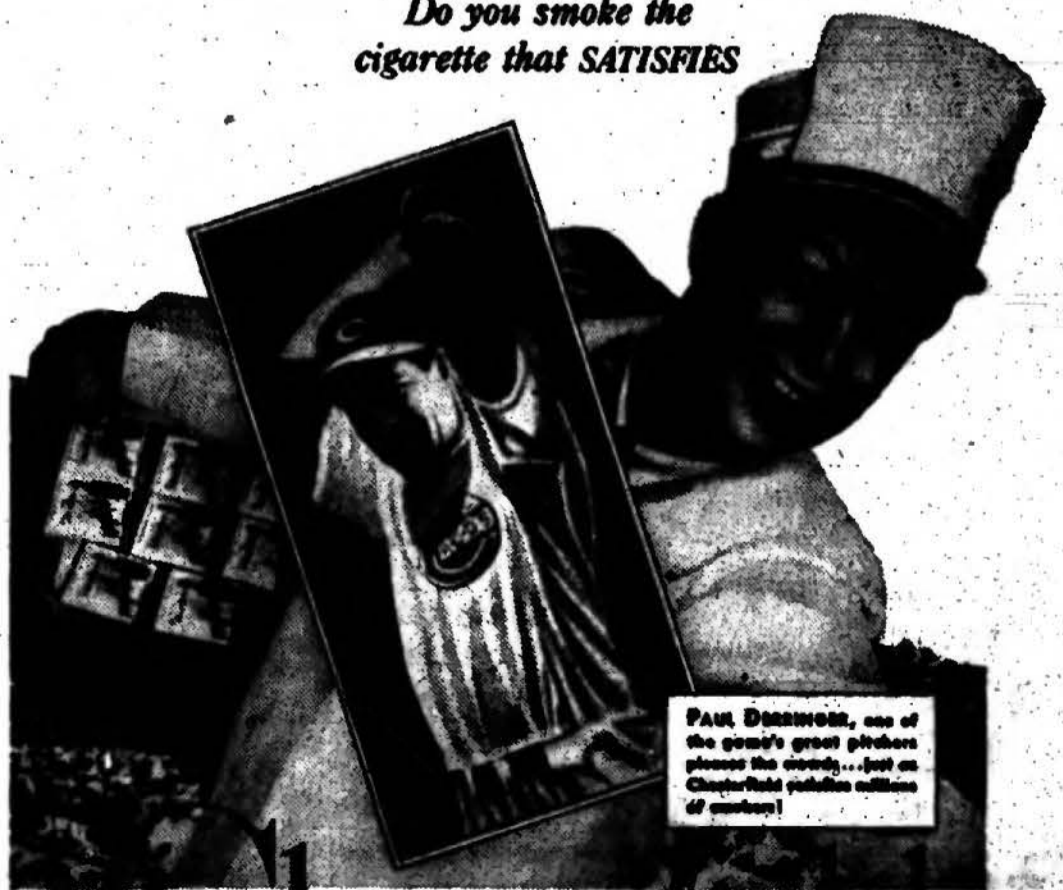
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
