Even when they come, library typists may be busy for several hours adding new subject cards.

When these cards and the book are finally juxtaposed by a cataloger, the Dewey classification number must be determined and all changes in dates, etc., made. Book pockets, plates, and other identification tags must now be typed. Lastly, the book must be shellacked to preserve its cover and the original print thereon. And all these procedures undergo careful checking before the book goes on a book-truck and finds its way to the parallel shelf.

So just remember that patience is a virtue, that the race is not always to the swift, that the meek shall inherit the earth, and that the people back of the desk have a lot more to put up with than a mere registrant. (You can write this on Dr. McGillicuddy's exam paper, too.)
