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Wes Raymond Boosts Flight Training Idea

Speaking before a group of Mercer students after chapel on Wednesday, Wesley Raymond, president of the Raymond Aero Corporation, described both CAA sponsored flight training programs as "an opportunity too great to be missed, one which gives students a manner in which to cooperate with a federally sponsored program and, at the same time, benefit personally."

Immediately afterward, students began enrolling for the courses to be conducted during the remaining portion of this school year and beginning around February 1. Though many have already expressed the desire to participate, there are still many vacancies in both primary and advanced schools.

Mr. Raymond further urged all students interested in taking this training to apply immediately at the registrar's office or contact him personally as there is required much preliminary registration before the programs can be started. Also, only units of ten students can be trained; and students who enroll early will have the preference should there be an insufficient number to complete every unit.

Other requirements remain substantially the same. Only senior college students are permitted to take either of the courses offered.

Library Gets Several New, Varied Books

Dr. Josiah Crudup, head of the department of Physics says that Elementary Photography by Gilford G. Quarles, one-time Mercer professor, is the best book on the subject he has ever seen.

Dr. Quarles, a personal friend of Dr. Crudup, is now assistant professor of Physics at the University of Alabama. He served in Dr. Crudup's position at Mercer several years ago when the latter was studying for his doctorate at the University of Chicago.

The book recently published has just been bought by the Library, and will soon be available to readers, according to Miss Annie Mays, librarian.

Among other new books that will soon be on the shelves is the New Ryming Dictionary and Poets Handbook, by Burges Johnson, professor of English at Syracuse university. Miss Mays said this book was bought because of the number of calls for a book of its type.

Miss Mays says that the New Yorker is now available for "young men only." Two other magazines, although not of general interest, are also being received, a Spanish and a French equivalent of Reader's Digest. They are not translations of the Reader's Digest, only similar publications.

The library is now receiving a French Journal published in New York.

Miss Mays has called attention to the New Webster's Dictionary near the newspaper files.
