

# First Bowling Round Completed Monday

The first games of the intra-mural bowling tournament got under way Monday afternoon, and the ADPI's, Phi Mu's, Ministers, Phi Deltas, SAE's, KA and Non-Frats I came out in the win column.

This tournament is being run off on the handicap basis, and the Phi Deltas who were high scorers Monday with 1,500 points, will have to play under the biggest burden. The Non-frats I were 90 points behind with 1,410, but were second.

Other team scores were as follows: SAE, 1,393; KA's, 1,358; ALT's, 1,356; Non-frat II, 1,338; Ministers, 1,336; ATO's, 1,328; Kappa Sig's, 1,305; ADPI's, 1,251; Non-sorority, 1,165; Phi Mu's, 1,118; and AXE 1,425. The Phi KA's forfeited.

Paschal won high individual scoring honors with an average of 113 2/3 per game, closely followed by Yarbrough with 113.

No schedule of future games was available for this issue, but next Monday's games will be placed on the Co-op Bulletin board. The full schedule will appear in the next issue.

The league play had been originally slated to be played on Tuesday afternoons, but the time was moved to Monday in order not to conflict with labs.

# Page Leads Way In Final Spring Game

With Tony Page leading the way with four touchdowns, Mercer's varsity team scored eight touchdowns against the reserves in a scrimmage last Saturday.

Page, converted fullback, made runs of 60, 85, 15 and 8 yards for his tallies. He was driving hard, and seldom was he stopped by one man. Leo Lazar scored twice and Blaylock and Shepard each scored once. Lazar made the most spectacular run of the day with a weaving 70-yard run for a score.

The varsity line was slow and its blocking was very bad. Many times the reserves would break through and spill the runner before he could get far. The team frequently got its signals crossed also.

The varsity was given the ball on its 20-yard line and advanced up the field with no downs or measurements being recorded. No pass plays were used except for several laterals.

## ONE MAN SHORT

The reserves had only 10 men available, but they made a fight of it and often stopped the varsity cold.

This scrimmage brought the spring practice session to an end for the time being, but it may be started up again later in the spring.

Further plans concerning more spring practice remain in doubt as Coaches Hooks and Smith had to return to their high school jobs to conduct spring work there.

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# Coach Hagan Arranges Large Tennis Schedule

Professor R. C. Hagan, coach of the varsity tennis team, this week announced a 15-game schedule, eight matches of which are to be played at home, for the Mercer racquet weilders.

It is the most extensive schedule attempted by the school and the unusual number of home matches is in accord with the new plan to get the students interested in the athletic program.

Besides this large number of home matches, the usual week-long trip to Florida will be taken. This enjoyable Southern tour is as fine a trip as any taken by a small Southern school. There will probably be another trip, a two day jaunt to Charlestown, but final arrangements for it have not been closed. The girls' team will accompany the varsity on the Florida excursion and play four matches during the time.

Professor Hagan added that he was still looking for players for his team as only three weeks remain before the opening match with Furman university. There has been another request by the coach; that all students refrain from walking across the tennis courts in order to help keep the surface in playing shape.

There is still an opportunity for a student with an automobile to take some of the players on the Florida trip with all ex-

penses paid. Anyone interested should contact Prof. Hagan immediately.
