## THE BEAR FACTS

At a recent meeting, a representative from each fraternity, the ministers, non-fraternity, and the veterans met with Mr. Vance and drew up plans for the Boys Intramurals which began with tag football on October 29. The teams will compete within themselves for points; the group with the most points being awarded a trophy at the end of the year.

In the fall quarter, tag football, volleyball, and table tennis will be played; in the winter quarter, basketball, badminton, foul shooting, and wrestling will be the sports; tennis, softball, and track and field events will come in the spring.

The eligibility rules are as follows: All students of the University except those excused from the required PT classes for medical reasons are eligible to participate in the intramural program except as provided further in these rules; if a student pledges a fraternity after having played for another team, he may transfer if he does so immediately; a team forfeit any contest in which it has used an ineligible player; if a team fails to appear within 15 minutes of the scheduled time for a contest, the officials may declare the game forfeited to the team ready to play; all protests must be made to the Director of Intramurals in writing within 24 hours after the game.

The point system is as follows: each team will receive 10 entrance points per player for the agreed number of players that it takes for the team; the team winning the most games in each activity will receive 200 achievement points; second and third place points will also be awarded.

The schedules of all contests are available in the Physical Education office.

The tag football schedule is nearing completion with the KA's in first place, undefeated and untied. The KA's have defeated the Phi Delta Theta's, SAE's, and the Kappa Sig's. The SAE's took second place with only one defeat against them and the Kappa Sig's and Veterans are still battling it out for third place.

The girls' badminton games are being played on Tuesday and Thursday nights. To date the Alpha Delta Pi's have defeated the Chi O's, the Phi Mu's have defeated the Non-Sorority, the Chi O's have won over the Phi Mu's, and the Non-Sorority defeated the Alpha Delta Pi's.
