Dean Burts Reviews Anthropology Book At Hardman Library

Man, An Autobiography by George Rippey Stewart was reviewed by Dean Richard C. Burts at the bi-monthly book review given at the Hardman Library.

The reader's interest is not focused on the life and works of the scientist Stewart but, rather, in the broad sweep of man's development from his origin as an ancient fish through the various stages of his physical and mental development.

Anthropology is regarded as a dim and distant subject to the average reader but, observed the Dean, Stewart has translated deep science into clear, understandable American idiom... even college students may read and comprehend it.

The Dean called his audience's attention to the book as an overview of man's evolution. The emphasis is placed on man's sociological and cultural advance in general terms rather than upon the accomplishments of tribes, races, nations, or individuals.
