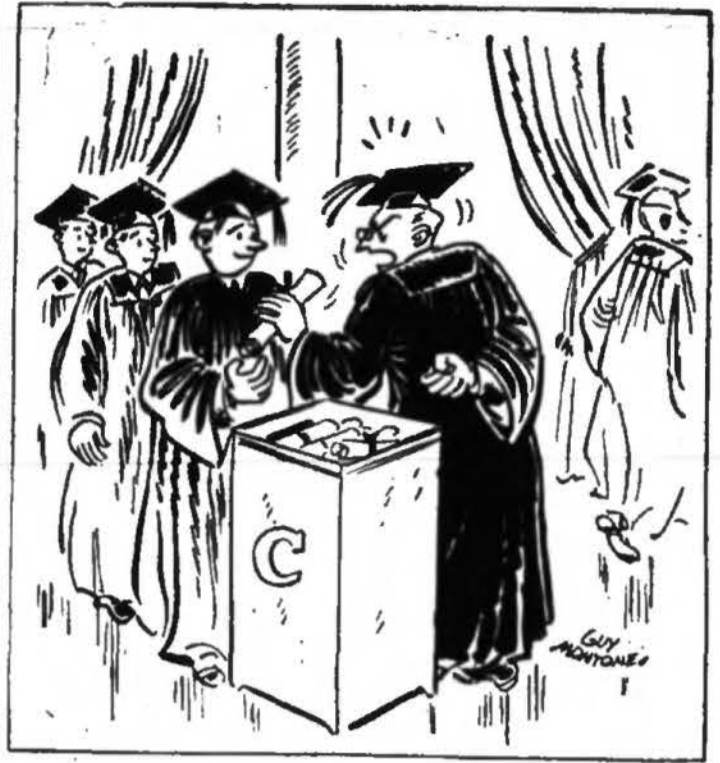
1. The replacing of concrete walks or some temporary forms such as stepping stones, crushed rock or gravel where the old walkways once were.
