MICA Addressed By Prof. Bouschy

Prof. Theodore Bouschy of the Political Science Department, addressed the members of the Mercer Independent Co-Eds Association at their regular meeting on October 8. His subject was "Principles of Democratic Government." Describing the political conditions in Palestine which caused him to come to America, Prof. Bouschy declared, "Too few American women are willing to make their contribution to the world. The world is crying to America for leadership."

Prof. Bouschy spoke of the "privileges which only Americans have—of being Christian, of being free, and of having free education." He closed his remarks with the reminder that democracy must be lived as well as taught if freedom is to prevail.
