Anthony Not Adverse To New Book

The book, **Human Destiny**, by Dr. Pierre-Lecomte du Novy, was reviewed by Dr. A. Bruce Anthony of the Economics Department Thursday afternoon, November 20, in the special reading room of the library.

And—getting myself off the formal journalistic high-horse—he did what seemed to do a quite adequate job of it too. You note my lack of assurance on that point. I was only one of a large number who were so uninformed about the subject that they could not effectively express even ignorance.

Human Destiny appears to be a scientific answer to materialism, with the conservation of spiritual values in mind. The author proposes to assert scientific subjectivity, the inadequacy of evolution for explaining human existence, and the provable existence of man's free will. Without a teleological hypothesis of evolution, he says, the appearance of man as he is today is totally inexplicable, and the overwhelming opposition of the laws of chance make this theory necessary.

Thus, his idea of "telefinalism" takes shape, a concept which "orients the march of evolution as a whole and has acted, ever since the appearance of life on earth, as a distinct directing force tending to develop a being spiritually and morally perfect being." Evolution continues with man alone but now on a spiritual plane. In the sphere of his freedom does his future lie; in the divine, his goal. It is man's work, the result of his conscience as he follows the perfect example of Christ, to move toward God, the Idea behind telefinalism, that this evolution process might not degenerate into equilibrium and eventual extermination because of his misusing his freedom.

Dr. Anthony expressed his general agreement with the author's scheme, but apparently for reasons other than those proposed, inasmuch as he pointed out several shortcomings.

I, in turn, agree with Dr. Anthony, for reasons perfectly obvious to my fellow stumblers in the dark—well, you may do as you will; I refer you to the book, obtainable in the library, or to the doctor, obtainable in the local drug store.

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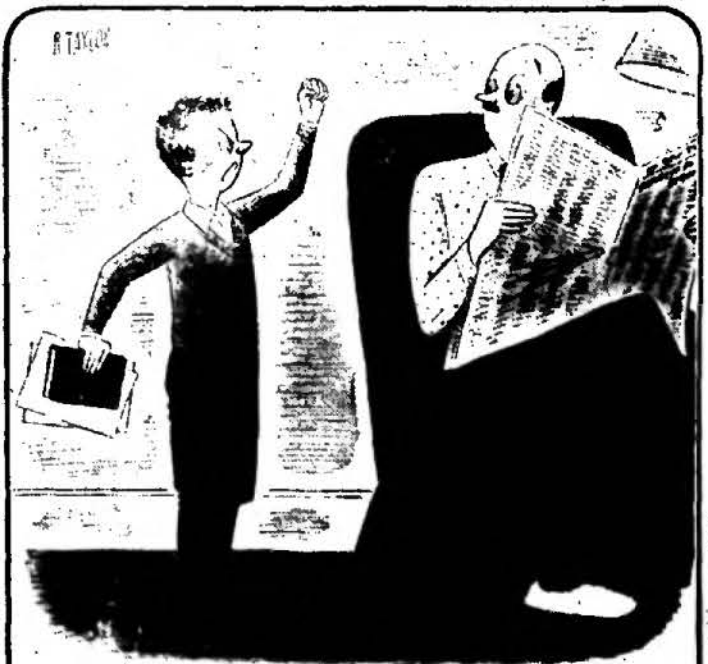
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
