The Faculty Club and the Mercer Auxiliary will sponsor a violin concert Tuesday evening, April 13, at 8 o'clock in Willingham Chapel. The violinists will be Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Alden, members of the faculty in the department of music at the University of North Carolina. They are graduates of Oberlin Conservatory, Oberlin, Ohio. Both Mr. and Mrs. Alden have served as principals of the North Carolina Symphony and in the orchestra conducted by Thor Johnson during the Mozart Festival held in Asheville, N. C., prior to the war. Mrs. Arthur Rich will accompany the violinists.
