VARSITY TIME TRIALS. Coach Jim Cowan put his 1948 cindermen through their paces in a time trial over the sodden Porter Stadium track Thursday afternoon. As could be expected, the muddy turf hampered the runners, and the times, as a consequence, were unspectacular. However, the trials sufficed to cast some light on the team's future prospects and some of its future stars.

Charlie Davis led the sprinters, taking the hundred yard dash in 10.5 seconds and the 220 in 23 seconds flat. Coney Cunningham and Carlton Barnes also were outstanding.

The indefatigable Broadus Willoughby topped the half milers with a 2 minute, 13 second run. Aulbert Kinsaul, "Ochie" Williamson, and Don Reeves followed in that order.

Ches Smith and Julius Green finished one-two in the 120 yard high hurdles. Forbes Davis captured the file in 5 minutes, 13 seconds closely followed by "Dopey" Reynolds.

INTRAMURAL TRACK HIGHLIGHTS. SAE entrant, Joe Roland, topped the field event scorers in the intramural track meet with two first places and 10 points. Joe cleared 5 feet, 6 inches in the high jump and took the broad jump with an 18 foot, 3/4 inch leap. In winning the high jump, Joe bested by one inch Kappa Sigma's Clarence Ray who kept the crowd gasping with his incredibly close leaps which for the last four consecutive times actually left the bar vibrating.

The biggest upset of the day came in the pole vault event when Phil Delt, Jim Mount, soared 10 feet, 6 inches to tie Kappa Alpha's crack vaulter, Ray Brewster. Jim's mark was one foot better than he had ever done before, and it is needless to say that one whole foot is no small amount of improvement for a pole vaulter. The mark set a new intramural record, beating the previous 10 foot record held by Tom Dykes.

SAE's Radford King, and Phi Dela Theta's Jack Culpepper dominated the weight events as each gained a first place and each set a new record. King hurled the shot 41 feet, 9 inches to top the old mark and gained a second place in the discus event. Culpepper, the defending discus champion, tossed the platter a record breaking 112 feet, and went on to place third in the javelin. Lanky Kappa Sig, Lamar Clements, captured first place in the event as he flipped the shaft 143 feet, 7 inches.

Mercer Loses Game To State Teachers

The Mercer baseball team opened its home season Thursday afternoon and was handed an 8 to 1 setback, their third in as many starts, by a crack Georgia State Teachers College nine from Statesboro, Ga.

Catcher Tom Dykes paced the hard-hitting Teachers who collected seven bases on balls, eight hits, and eight runs off four Mercer hurlers while the Bears were being limited to five scattered safeties by Statesboro's ace righthander, Bo Whaley. Dykes, a basketball star at Mercer in 1947, collected three hits in four trips to the plate and knocked in four runs. His double in the fifth frame with bases loaded was the outstanding play of the game.

Centerfielder John Davidson led the partially stymied Bear attack with a double and a single in four times at bat, the double scoring Walker Whittle with Mercer's only run.

Whittle, a stocky right-hander, opened on the mound for Mercer and held the Teachers hitless until the second inning when Dykes hit a whistling single to left field and scored on a double to begin the Statesboro onslaught.

The visitors exploded for three runs in the third which were the results of two infield errors and two singles.

The Bears retaliated in their half of the third and spoiled a possible shutout for Statesboro's Whaley when Whittle doubled over the left fielder's head and scored on Davidson's two bagger.

The deciding play, however, came in the fifth when Carowan, who had taken over for Whittle in the fourth and had held the Teachers hitless, walked three consecutive men to load the bases.

Southpaw Jack Smith relieved Carowan at this point and was promptly touched for a double and three runs when Dykes made a

Howard College of Birmingham, Ala., topped the Mercer trackmen 78 to 53 Saturday afternoon at Porter Stadium in the season's first meet.

Bill Kremer of Howard and Aulbert Kinsaul of Mercer were the individual stars of the day as the former captured three first places and the latter, two.

Mercer cindermen who gained first places were Jim Mount in the pole vault (10 feet, 10 inches), Aulbert Kinsaul in the half mile (2:13.5 minutes) and the two mile (11:35.5 minutes) runs "Dopey" Reynolds in the high jump (5 feet, 7 inches), and Lamar Davenport with the javelin (146 feet, 1 inch).

Mount's 10 feet, 10 inches with the pole vault was a new meet record for Mercer.
