

LAWRENCE FUCHS SPEAKS TO MERCER INDEPENDENT CLUBS

Lawrence Fuchs, Chairman of the Student Division of the United World Federalists and member of the National Executive Committee, spoke at a joint meeting of the Mercer Independent Co-ed's Association and the Mercer Independent Men's Association Wednesday night in the Theology building at Mercer.

Fuchs, a student at New York University, in addition to addressing several other groups on the campus, has been instrumental in the organization of a chapter of the World Federalists at Wesleyan College.

Price of Preparedness

The Student Chairman outlined three possible policies that the United States government could pursue at this time, the first being the program of all-out preparedness which America is following today. He repeatedly emphasized the question, "What is the price of preparedness?" and that the liberty of the American people is that price.

As a second policy, he offered that of preventative war, or the dropping of enough atom bombs on Russia and her satellites to cause sufficient damage to make further aggression by them impossible. This Fuchs considered to be the most fantastic of all the proposals.

WWF Program

The third alternative is that of the United World Federalists. This program would be based on the present United Nations organization, but in order to make the system work effectively, seven major changes would be made in the present set-up, namely, the adoption of:

1. Provisions prohibiting the possession by any nation or armaments beyond the level required for internal policing.
2. Provisions requiring control by the World Federal government of atomic energy developments and of other scientific develop-

ments easily diverted to mass destruction.

3. Provisions requiring such world police forces as are necessary to enforce world law and security.
4. Amendments to the world constitution that will assure adequate protection to persons affected by it.
5. Authority to raise revenue under a carefully defined and limited direct taxing power independent of national taxation.
6. Reasonable provisions for amendments of the constitution.
7. Provisions for making world law enforceable directly upon the individual.

Plans are now being made to establish a chapter of the United World Federalists on the Mercer campus.
