Crippled Children League Calls For Help in Easter Sale Campaign

Twenty-eight years ago a crippled child was an unusual sight. Because of barriers which included ignorance, indifference, poverty, and shame these handicapped children had no place to go and nothing to do except live out their lives in solitude and hopelessness.

Today Georgia has 30,000 hand-

capped children, (9.2 of the total population). The 30,000 crippled children are dependent for help from the Crippled Children League of Georgia. The League is almost solely dependent for funds upon the annual sale of Easter Seals.

The 1950 sale of Easter Seals will begin March 9 and close on April 9. Contributions will enable the League to continue its work of restoring the handicapped to useful and happy lives.

Our contributions to this sale make it possible for thousands to be helped who may not otherwise receive treatment of any kind because of inadequate funds.

Of the state's 30,000 children in need of help we still have 8,000 who have received no treatment at all.

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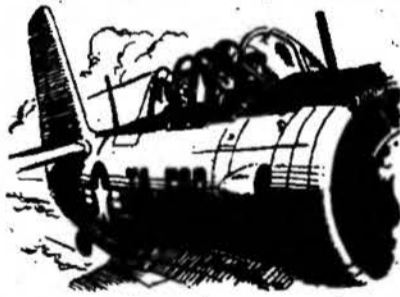
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
