## Cassell, Outstanding Bears' Player; Cowan Has Excellent 4-Year Record

A loud "war whoop" went up in Mercer's Co-op last Monday morning at mail time. The blonde junior, from whom the noise came could not contain himself and out he dashed in the direction of Porter gym. There was much rejoicing within the offices of one "Footsie" Cowan when he learned that Glenn "T-Bone" Cassell would not have to report, as feared, to his famous Uncle.

Cassell, Kentuckian with a state pride rivaling Texas, is famous for his dribbling ability and his underhand pass. He is one of the smoothest ball handlers on the squad and has a very quick change of pace.

"T Bone" was one of the sparkplugs of Cowan's outstanding team last year, and his services should add much to the Bears' chances this season. With no high scorer to replace the departed

Wilkes, the Bears must depend on good team play and Cassell is fine as a team man.

Coach Jim Cowan, who begins his fifth season Monday as Mercer mentor, boasts a 67-28 won-lost record in his four previous seasons here. Last year's team sported a 17-6 record which compared favorably with the 17-4 mark set by the famous 1947-48 team.

Cowan received his B.S. degree from Davidson College. During his stay there he participated in basketball, football, and track and saw three years of varsity action in each sport. In basketball he ranked 6, 3, and 2, consecutively, for the three years in Southern Conference scoring.

He was awarded the Master's degree in Physical Education at the University of North Carolina in '49.
