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research. This would result in clarification of existing laws.

To provide refresher courses for lawyers as well as a broader education for students.

To cooperate with members of the bar in furnishing free or low-cost legal service through a clinic in the law building.

The corporation was granted a charter by the judge of the Superior Court, Macon Circuit. The powers of the corporation, as stated by the charter, are educational, with the authority to accept contributions for providing funds to construct and operate the center, to erect the needed buildings, and to carry out the purposes of the center itself.

A building estimated to cost about \$700,000 will be needed to carry on the work of the Law Center. An endowment of \$2,000,000 will be necessary for its satisfactory operation.

It was pointed out Friday by Dean Prince that the Walter F. George School of Law and the Southeastern Law Foundation are better able to execute their purposes because they are free of government support and domination. Private schools involve no "political axe-grinding" in their production of well-trained lawyers.
