

GLEE CLUB TO PERFORM SOON

Officers Are Elected and Trip is Planned.

Although the personnel is not yet complete, officers of the Mercer Glee Club were elected at a meeting Thursday afternoon and the organization of the club was effected. Three road trips are already scheduled, one of which is to be taken before Christmas.

The officers who were elected for the 1923-24 season are: C. C. Sanders, president; Rabun L. Brantley, vice-president; Roy L. Hurst, manager; R. E. ("Parson") Chandler, assistant manager, and Wayne Hogan, secretary.

A musical comedy, "Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow," written and set to music by Hurst and Sanders of the club, is to be the feature of this year's program. The play, which is to be presented in three parts, promises to be a most entertaining one. It combines the regular line of minstrelsy conducted by "Parson" Chandler and Dave Rice with the musical program to arrive at a pleasing effect.

An elaborate setting with something new in amateur lighting effects has been arranged. Special costumes have been ordered which will include the old colonial dress in orange and black and prophesied styles for the future. The first part of the musical comedy portrays the colonial days, the second is a modern setting and the final division takes a fling at what may be the gay life of the future.

Worked in with the program are several songs with both words and music written by members of the club. Among the new ones are "The Macon Blues," "Mercer Today," and "Here's to Dear Old Mercer." A number of classical and other popular songs are also to be rendered.

The first trip will be about the first of December when the club will play in Macon, Atlanta, Griffin, Gainesville, Toccoa, Hartwell, Elberton, Athens and Macon. On February 1st another tour will be taken which will include Cedartown, Rome, Dalton, Chattanooga, Carrollton, LaGrange, and a few other places. An April trip will carry them outside of the state into Alabama where they will play Birmingham, Montgomery, Anniston, Gadsden and other places that will be arranged later.
