Hendricks, Buice Seek Presidency Of Student Body

Poster-making, campaign promises, and all the glories of political campaigns for the Student Elections will end tomorrow with the deciding bout at the polls.

The polls for the Student Elections will be set up in the Co-op between the hours of 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. For those interested results will be posted at regular intervals in the Co-op until final decisions are announced.

Slates have been presented in Student Chapel by the two parties and campaigns have been prominent during the past two weeks. These parties are the Cooperative Party and the Progressive Party. The Cooperative party chairman is Charles Waddy and Progressive Party chairman is Sonny Posey.

Cooperative party held chapel last Tuesday, at which time party platforms and slate of officers were announced.

Progressive party held chapel Wednesday, giving slate and their choices for the Student Government positions.

The Cooperative Party offered on its platform a revision of the student government, and a chance for the students to look at an honor system, then a vote during the next school year.

The Progressive Party platform included a promise of a six-page edition of the Cluster, immediate installation of an honor system, and a student book exchange.

Presidential candidates for the Student Body are Joe Hendricks on the Progressive ticket and Avon Buice running on the Cooperative slate. Both candidates are seniors next year and have attended Mercer all three years' college.

Jack Mansfield and Robert Sparks seek the office of vice-president. Sparks representing the Progressive party, and Mansfield is Co-operative candidate.

For the office of secretary-treasurer student body are Peggy Carlisle (Progressive) and Teeny Moody (Cooperative).

Vying for the positions of Cluster editor are Dan Cline and C. C. Lynch. Buddy Moore and Barbara Alford seek the office of business manager. Cline and Alford are the cooperative candidates, while Lynch and Moore run on the Progressive ticket.

Progressive Barbara Seift and Bill Taylor seek the jobs of editor and business manager against Co-operative Freda Cagle and Carswell Hughes.

The Progressive Party offers for the Student Activities Committee Hugh Hodges, Arthur Rich, Delano Maurice, Cindy Sartin, Nancy Attaway, and Allen Williams.

The Cooperative Party has chosen for candidates of this position, Dean Denmark, Carolyn Hayes, Dot Poole, Joe Frank Lowe, Spencer Ludlow, and Lawson Sayer.

The Athletic Committee will be composed of three of the following: Tommy Mixon, Ann Coggin, John Binns, (Progressive); Leslie Tilley, Charles Carter, and Mary Frances Swatts, (Cooperative).

Bill Bonner and Joe Watson seek the office of president of the senior class. Bonner is the Cooperative candidate, Watson is the Progressive.

A Moliere comedy of the time of the French King Louis XIV will be the next production of the Mercer Players and Alpha Omega dramatic fraternity.

"The Imaginary Invalid", a satire on the physicians of the seventeenth century, will be presented at Willingham Chapel, Mercer University, on Thursday and Friday nights, April 15 and 16.

Julian Franklin of Gainesville will star in the role of Argan, the imaginary invalid. Annette Robertson of Reidsville will play the feminine lead of Toinette, a servant girl.

Other principals in the cast are Carolyn Ricks of Soperton as Angelique, Chlo Gratigny of Macon as Beline, Cecil Jackson of Campton as Monsieur de Bennefoi, Ray Neal of Moultrie as Cleante, James Alford of Waverly Hall as Monsieur Defois, Bush Gleaton of Macon as Thomas Defois, Glenda Best of Macon as Louise, Earl Slaphey of Andersonville as Bertrande, and James Brauch of Montrose as Monsieur Purgon.

Members of Mercer Players and Alpha Psi Omega are making original period costumes for the production. The men in the cast will wear long powdered wigs as was customary during the seventeenth century.

Written in 1663, The Imaginary Invalid is considered by critics as

one of Moliere's most delightful comedies. The three-act play is characterized by its fast action and quick humor. It is the story of a hypochondriac who wishes to marry his daughter to a physician in order to lessen his doctor bills.
