La Dee" to the people with whom she shared God's love. She never lost her love for fun and her vivacious personality. Those characteristics became great assets as she went about meeting people and making friends in China and the United States.

Miss Moon remained in China with only very short furloughs from 1873 until 1912. She spent forty years of love and service through hard times and good, through rebellion and rejoicing, through famine and friendship. Only once did she have to leave China. During the Boxer Rebel-

lion she and other missionaries went to Japan. Of her work she said, "People talk of the hardships of missionary life. 'Tis true there are hardships, but I am so happy in the work that I never see the hardships."

In 1912 famine hit the area of China in which Lottie Moon was serving. Saddened by the deaths of many of her friends and actually starving to death herself, she left China for the last time. She died on December 24, 1912, while her ship was anchored at Kobe, Japan. "Yet for such life there is no death!" states Mrs. Una Lawrence in the closing chapter of her book, *Lottie Moon*. Southern Baptist women have given her name to the Christmas offering which she led them to begin. So each year at Christmas, Lottie Moon live again.
