erson's fourth-seeded Gordon Bulldogs dropped their only two losses to non-seeded clubs. Coach Parnell Ruark's Georgia Military College five beat the Bulldogs 75-68, and Coach Clifford Coggins's Middle Georgia Wolverines took the measure of Gordon 87-79 in regular season play.

The team most prominently mentioned as the dark horse of the tournament is Coach Luke Rushton's Young Harris Mountain Lions. The Lions have a 17-4 record for the season against some of the toughest JC competition in the South. The Conference record of 3-2 left them out of the running for the season, but the Purple and White quintet from the mountains boasts the services of center John Adcock, who has a 96 point per game average.
