Tommy Johnson, will make his appearance as Class AA Doubles Champion. New candidates Dick Post and Russell Archer will be slugging for berths also, as will Luther Mills, Jimmy Henson, and Martha Ann Abbott, a female contender no less.

The Bruins ended last season with a 4-7 record, but with this year's promising aspirants, the schedule should be swept with hardly any trouble.

The Bears open their season, as schedule, on March 22, at FSU. The first home match will be on March 30, against Georgia State College of Business Administration.

Ohio U. Nixes Unlimited Cuts

(ACP) - No change will be made in the present cut system at Ohio University. After discussing proposed alterations, the Men's Union Governing Board has decided against an unlimited cut system for the school. The President of the Board, Joe Phillips, said the main drawback against unlimited cutting at Ohio University is that the school is not on a plane with Ivy or eastern schools that offer such a system. Said Phillips: "We're not a highly selective university like they are and, therefore, the plan would not work."

Phillips said that individual professors at Ohio University have their "own quirks" about cutting classes. Some permit no cuts, some grant three, and others allow an unlimited amount. Currently, the general practice is to permit three cuts during the semester.

Stick to the popper for making pop corn, too, they advise. One coed tried to use her electric coffee pot to make popcorn—with sad results.

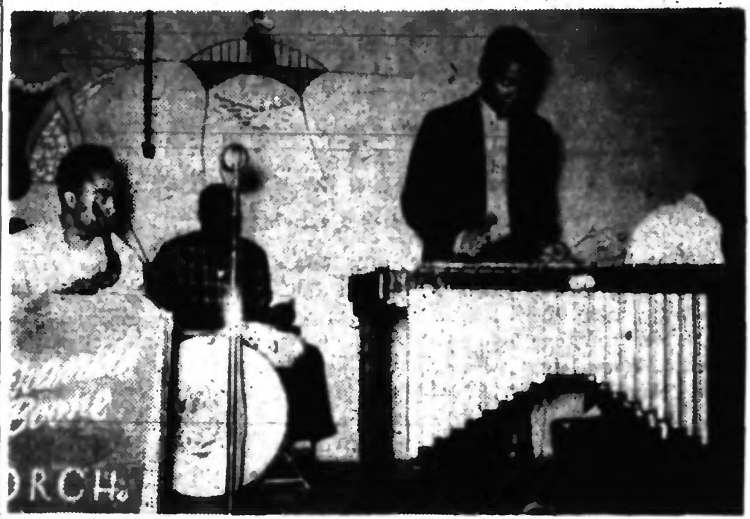
The University of Teheran is offering American students two fellowships for study or research in Iran during 1957-58. It was announced by Kenneth Holland, President of the Institute of International Education, 1 East 67th Street, New York City.

Closing date for applications is April 1, 1957.

The awards cover maintenance, tuition and round-trip transportation between the United States and Iran. Men receive room and board in a university dormitory.

The grants are for study or research in the sciences or humanities, with special opportunities for concentration on Persian language and literature. Some knowledge of the Persian language is required.

Candidates under 35 years of age will get preference for these awards. Dependents may not accompany grantees. Eligibility are: (1) U. S. citizenship; (2) a Bachelor's degree by the time the award is taken up; (3) a good academic record and demonstrated capacity for independent study or research; (4) good character, personality and adaptability, and (5) good health.
