amendments affect the status of the Honor System? An inquiry to the Honor Council brought this reply:

"We feel that the Honor System has gained tremendous moral support despite the fact that the proposed amendments failed to receive the required two-thirds approval by the Mercer students participating in the recent student government elections. Since amendment one failed by only sixteen votes and amendment two failed by only three votes, this indicates that a vast majority of Mercer students approve the amendments. We are encouraged by the results and will not yield to despair but promise to conduct an even more relentless struggle to perfect the Honor System. We are determined that a minority opinion will not defeat the will of the majority."
