

Mercerians Get 10 Hours' Credit For Europe Tour Next Summer; 25 Can Go

Officials of Mercer have announced the continuation of a European study and travel program for the summer of 1960.

Beginning in 1956, this program was added to the Mercer curriculum to enable students and teachers to study the Western cultural heritage at its source, for academic credit.

The 58-day flying Fine Arts Study Tour will include the most important cultural centers of Europe — Athens, Rome, Paris, London, Florence, Madrid, Vienna and Istanbul — and many of the more picturesque villages of the continental countryside.

College students taking this tour will get credit for 10 hours, or two courses, of academic work.

Professor Marshall Daugherty, chairman of Mercer's art department, will conduct the tour, assisted by Mrs. Daugherty who will also serve as tour mother.

Additional information about the tour may be secured by writing Professor Daugherty, art department, Mercer University, Macon, Ga.

A special feature of the tour will be the world-renowned Passion Play at Oberammergau in Germany. Given every ten years for many centuries, it is a reverent and moving portrayal of the life and death of Christ.

Other features will include excursions, lectures and meetings with interesting Europeans, theater and opera performances, and visits to art studios and craft centers.

The limit of 25 enrollees is expected to be quickly reached, according to university officials who recall the overwhelming response to the announcement of the last tour. They predict that registration will be closed by Christmas.

Practice Teachers Increase Yearly

By the end of the school year 1959-1960 Mercer will have had between 66 and 65 students doing student teaching. This is a greater number than Mercer has ever had before.

Most of the students do their teaching during the winter quarter, but there are nine students teaching at the present time.

Five Centers

This teaching is done in five centers. These are Bibb county, Griffin-Spalding county, Newman City, Warner Robins and Houston county and Dougherty county.

Dougherty county has just opened as a student teaching center to take care of the large number of student teachers. These centers place students where they are needed most and provide them with a place to stay.

No matter how large the number of students, there are always more girls than boys preparing for teaching. The ratio is ap-

proximately 70:30. However, the number of students teaching in elementary school is about equal to those teaching in secondary school. Secondary school student teachers are primarily English teachers or Social Studies teachers.

The requirements to do student teaching in the subject matter field, such as English or Science, must be completed along with four courses in education. Students practicing teaching are not allowed to take any other courses.
