This is the second game of the season for Mercer, and although the game with the Georgia Bulldogs was not a success in so far as the score was against them, it was an immeasurable success in that for the first time in fourteen years a Mercer team has been able to score against the wily Athenians.

Offer no Apologies
Mercer has no apologies to make for the loss of the game, no alibi to offer, for the Red and Black team of Georgia played a good game and defeated our team. However, Mercer also played a great game, completing five passes for 69 yards gain, while the Georgia team attempted seven passes for no gains.

On the first down the Bulldogs gained 7 yards, while Mercer gained 6. In running offenses, the opposing team gained 128 yards, and the Bears chalked 106 yards. Georgia kicked eight times, totaling 385 yards; Mercer kicked nine times, making 270 yards.
