College, her M.A. degree from the University of Chicago, and the Ph.D. from John Hopkins University, where she majored in classical archeology.

She participated in the Agora Excavations, Athens, Greece, in 1934-35 and was director of the University of Michigan Archeological Laboratory from 1938-41.

Mr. Davis, 30, is a native of Woodstown, N.J., and for the past three years has been teaching and studying for a Ph.D. degree at Vanderbilt University.

He received his M.A. degree from Vanderbilt and completed his undergraduate work at Guilford College in North Carolina, where he received his A.B. degree in 1961.

Prior to continuing his graduate studies at Vanderbilt in 1958, Mr. Davis was associated with the First National Bank of Woodstown, N.J., from 1955-58. He was associated with the American Security and Trust Co., Washington, D.C., 1952-54, and the Alexandria National Bank, Alexandria, Va., from 1954-55.

Mr. Hough, 34, comes to Mercer from West Virginia University, where he held a graduate assistantship in German from January until June of this year.

He received the M.A. degree from West Virginia University in 1959, three years after receiving the B.S. degree from the same university. He later did graduate study in German History at the University of Southern California.

Mr. Robertson, 39, received the B.S. degree from the University of Chattanooga and the M.A. degree from Columbia University.

He served as a school administrator in the Presbyterian Mission in the Congo Republic from 1949-60, when he was forced to leave the country because of local political unrest.

During the past year Mr. Robertson has taught mathematics at the University of Chattanooga.

Prior to going to the Congo Republic, he was a chemist with the Chattanooga Medicine Co., Chattanooga, Tenn.
