The Little Foxes

The Mercer Drama Department will present *The Little Foxes*, by Lillian Hellman, on April 12 and 13. Superficially this play concerns a family of Southern landowners just at the turn of the century. Around their seemingly "worthy" attempts, however, to establish a brick industry, the author has shown with unquestionable success how central to every human enterprise is man's essential ruthlessness and selfishness. Regina and her two brothers, Ben and Oscar Hubbard, display an unmitigated harshness and brutality in their dealings with both themselves and others, and such unpleasant characteristics, it would seem, to the playwright at least, are representative of the general run of men.

Like the later Henrik Ibsen, the forerunner of much modern drama, Lillian Hellman is unwaveringly naturalistic in her approach

to life. Apparently, she is fascinated with the sordid side of life, and, one might add, depicts it with unusual skill and understanding. Strictly speaking, her characters are generally mean and unscrupulous individuals, who, when they are not engaged in swindling or undermining each other, are busy terrifying the weak. In this degenerate kind of life, the situation, characters, and catastrophe are thoroughly unpleasant. Virtue never triumphs. Unadulterated wickedness and villainy are as much the ascendant qualities in the individual when the play begins as, when it ends, if you have the idea that man is basically good, you will, on seeing this play, be forced to alter your opinion somewhat or change it entirely, for Miss Hellman offers a most convincing argument that man is anything but good.

The set for this first production of the spring quarter will be done in blue, a cold blue, of course, to create a chilly atmosphere in which these most unlikable humans, for a space of several hours, (Continued on page 4)

Article To Be Ratified

The following articles of the Student Government Association Constitution were amended by a two-thirds vote of the Student Senate and must be ratified by the student body in a secret ballot election in which a majority of the members must vote, and a two-thirds of those voting may pass the amendments. This will be done in the general elections to be held on April 10.

The articles are presented as amended; changes being indicated by bold print.

A. Article II, Section 2 (d) Two day students, two dormitory students, one student from the Walter F. George School of Law and one student from the freshman class of the Macon Hospital School of Nursing, who shall represent the sentiments of those respective groups, and who shall have one vote each.

B. Article V, Section 2 (a) Se-

lection shall be made by the President, Vice-president, Secretary-Treasurer and Freshman Adviser of the Student Government Association, the Chief Justice and Clerk of the Honor Council, together with three faculty members appointed by the President of the University . . .

C. Article V, Section 2 (b) The selection committee shall submit a questionnaire to those students who meet these requirements. On the basis of the questionnaires the committee has the power to appoint three seniors, three juniors and three sophomores to serve on the Honor Council. This distribution may be altered when deemed best. These appointments shall be made by the second Tuesday in March, and the Council shall assume its duties on the last Tuesday in April.

D. Article VIII, Section 3 (f) To serve as the publicity committee of the Student Government Association.

E. Article IX, Section 1 The administration of the Student Activities Fund allocated by the University shall be by a board known as the Student-Faculty Board of Appropriations.

Section 3, Duties

(a) To hear petitions and recommendations for additional budget allocations from all student organizations and from all student organizations and publications using Student Activities Funds and to approve or reject such petitions and recommendations.

(b) To select faculty advisers for each agency drawing on the Student Activities Fund.

(c) To receive and approve reports from faculty advisers in each area at the end of each quarter concerning the funds spent, the funds committed, and proposed plans of expenditures of the remaining funds.

(d) To discontinue funds of using organizations in the event said organizations do not comply with Section 3, Paragraph b of this Article until such a report is submitted by the faculty adviser.

(e) To publish upon completion of allocation of funds to using organizations the total allocation to each using organization in the Mercer Cluster not later than two weeks after completion.
