 the inhabitants in the metropolitan area are principally engaged in processing and distributing agricultural products from the surrounding fertile farm lands, which include cotton, grain, pulpwood, peaches, peanuts and pecans. Valdosta and the surrounding area produce well over half of the nation's naval stores of turpentine, according to King. "Valdosta was settled in 1859. George M. Troup, governor of Georgia, had chosen the name of the Italian province Valle d'Aosta ('vale of beauty') for his estate and when the town was incorporated in 1860 the name was adopted, in modified form," writes King.

In 1940 Warner Robins was known as Wellston and was a small village of about 50 inhabitants. According to King when the federal government later built an army air base there, the city sprang into being 'like a boom town of gold rush days.' Its name came from Brig. Gen. Augustine Warner Robins, one of the founders of the modern U. S. air force, states the author. He also notes that the base became the home of the 14th air force ("Flying Tigers"). "Warner Robins" is one of 411 articles which are new in the latest edition of the reference work. It is also one of 78 places in the United States which are included in Britannica for the first time.

In the 1962 edition particular attention was given to articles on cities, states and regions of the United States, in order to incorporate pertinent information made available by the 1960 U. S. census reports.

 det corps. The ROTC department is making available information concerning the decoration as part of the nation-wide observance of the medal's 100th anniversary.

The Medal of Honor was formally established in 1862 when President Abraham Lincoln signed a joint resolution of Congress that created the award. The fierce fighting and deeds of valor of the Civil War focused national attention to the need of recognition for such acts of courage. It was in answer to this need that Congress established the award which was to be presented for "gallantry in action" and valor "above and beyond the call of duty."

Since its creation in 1862, 2199 Medals of Honor have been issued by presidents of the United States.
