Mercer Faculty Ph.D's Now Nearly 50 Per Cent

The number of Mercer professors holding earned doctorates has risen to approximately 50 per cent of the total faculty. Dean Robert H. Spiro announced this week.

This new percentage represents an 18 per cent increase in the last three years.

Two professors earned their Ph.D's just this June: Edward J. Newby, chairman of the Modern Language Department, in German, at University of North Carolina, and Henry Y. Warnock, associate professor of history, in American history, at Northwestern.

Three other professors are on leaves of absence to do further work toward their doctorates. William LaCour of the Mathematics Department has an assistantship at the University of Alabama, and Georgia B. Christopher of the English Department is studying at Yale under a Danforth Teaching Grant.

Lucille Pollard has an assistantship at the University of Georgia where she is working toward her doctorate in Educational Psychology.

Fourteen other professors did

graduate work and study this summer. They are:

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"Lady On 'Hall" Braves Cats, Frogs, Mercer Men

Mercer's solitary "lady on the hall" is an easy going sort of person who says Mercer men are generally "as polite and well behaved" group of young gentlemen as you could hope to meet, at least most of the time.

But there are exceptions. Mrs. Josephine Johnson confesses. Mrs. Johnson is housekeeper for the university's three men's dormitories and the only female allowed on the dormitory halls.

Her familiar shout of "lady on the hall" echoes through the dorms several times a day and, she admits, has occasionally sent some of her young gentlemen scurrying for shelter.

This is one of her occupational hazards, Mrs. Johnson says, but not the worse one by any means. Since last spring quarter a new worry has been added to her housemother's list—snakes.

It seems a senior in Shorter Hall decided he would like a snake for a pet. Mrs. Johnson related, so he captured one and caged it in his dresser drawer. The snake didn't bother anyone, she said, but when the janitor found out about it he quit cleaning the room and it soon became a health hazard. Housing director Arthur Walton evicted the pet.

Cats cause trouble too, Mrs. Johnson says. Advanced biology students have an unpleasant habit of bringing their partially dissected cats back to rooms for study. Sometimes they end up hanging from closet coat hanger or strewn over a dorm hall. But this problem is about taken care of, Mrs. Johnson says. The cats are big and easy to spot. It's the small dissected frogs that are hard to keep up with.

But all in all Mrs. Johnson says she has a pretty pleasant job. "I've enjoyed working with the Mercer

boys. All of them have been extremely nice and polite to me."

College Assists, Spiro Says Here

The task of the liberal arts college is never to indoctrinate but to "assist in education," said Robert H. Spiro, Dean of the College of Liberal Arts, at the first university chapel Tuesday.

In this assistance, he said, the college has both a conservative and a liberal function. He named the two functions as passing on the knowledge of the past—a conservative task—and re-examining the past in the light of the present—liberal function. Spiro likened the task to the Roman god Janus who looks both forward and backward.

"All disciplines must be studied and examined," he said, which will cause both "doctrinaire conservatives and liberals" to criticize the liberal arts institution.

Spiro named "loyalty to truth" as the distinctive dedication of both colleges and professors.

Preceding his address, Spiro welcomed the new students to Mercer and introduced the new faculty members. Dr. Arthur L. Rich led the student body in singing the alma mater, and Dr. Harold M. Manus gave the benediction.
