

Camp Macmillan St. Art.

Sept. 12th, 1864.

Dear Brother Marcus!

Jimmy

arrived in camp yesterday sick
as usual with Chief. I think
it was rather indiscreet in me to
have sent him home, and had I
known what I do now should not
have done so, though we never
learn, but by experience. I
must necessarily be short in
this as the mail will have to be
sent off early, and I have
not much time to write on
account of it. Jimmy's roping
was very heavy, a great deal
more so than I expected, and
consequently I will have to spend

to you to help me out. Brother Geo.
R. let him have seventy (\$70.) dollars
at one time and sister Ada
of Mason ten (\$10.) dollars at
another and I effected a loan
of sister Suzer myself, all
which amounts, with Sister's
which was one hundred (\$100) dollars,
to one hundred and eight (\$180)
dollars in full. You will greatly
oblige me if you will cancel
these sums for me, and charge
them on my account.

Brother Geo. R. and Sister Ada
may refuse to receive the pay
but I hope you will not
admit of a refusal. Give
my love to Adela and Percie
and should you give the

Country before you hear from
me again, remember me
to sister and tell her that I
fully sympathize with
her in all her afflictions
I do not think the day is
very far before there will
be a happy reunion
of your once happy
